Sabrina do Rosario is the Director of KWU Community Resilience HUB. She joined KWU in 2022 as the Campus Coordinator for the Community Resilience Hub. Originally from São José dos Campos, Brazil, Sabrina has been living in the USA for eight years, three of those in Kansas. Her inspiration to study and advocate for

the environment was influenced by experiencing the exuberant wonders of the Atlantic Rain Forest, visiting beaches on São Paulo North shore, and enjoying the mountains from Paraíba Valley, where she grew up. Her music celebrates the joy, sorrow, grandeur and silliness of life, especially life on the prairies. She backs her rich voice with piano, guitar and the audience itself. Ann's concerts tell stories and paint portraits, brilliantly colored and unexpected, sparked with an irresistible stage presence. She appears annually at The Land Institute in central Kansas and debuted in 2018 at the Walnut Valley Festival, Winfield, Kan. She entertains nationally at festivals, farmers markets, fancy theaters, conferences and



backyards — a hundred dates a year.

Melissa Dehner discovered her love for art and nature as a child growing up in Colorado, and later Kansas. She still spends tons of time outdoors, walking with her dog, watching and listening to birds, and taking note of the endless details in trees and plants, insects, and animals.
